

## MEMORANDUM OF SUPPORT

### ENSURE ACCESS TO HEALTHCARE SERVICES FOR INCARCERATED WOMEN

The New York State Coalition Against Domestic Violence (NYSCADV) urges the New York State Legislature to pass this legislation, which will create a women's health education program in state and local correctional facilities. This critical bill is needed to improve the health of incarcerated women and improve the knowledge and skills of facility medical staff in providing health services to such women.

Incarcerated women should not be deprived of compassionate and comprehensive healthcare services. Yet, in New York State's correctional facilities, comprehensive healthcare services are not available. This means incarcerated women do not have access to gynecological care and are not consistently provided prenatal care, among other services. Moreover, prison medical staff are not trained in the special medical needs of women, including providing professional, respectful and informed care of women who have been victims of domestic and sexual violence.

NYSCADV supports the passage of this bill, which would rectify the aforementioned gaps in healthcare provisions to incarcerated women by amending the Correction and Public Health Laws to:

- Establish a women's health education program in state and local correctional facilities to educate facility medical staff on the special medical needs of women, including training on how to provide care to victims of domestic or sexual violence;
- Direct correctional facilities to provide gynecological care;
- Provide pregnant inmates with prenatal care, including regular check-ups and access to prenatal vitamins and specialized diet; and,
- Direct the NYS Department of Health to conduct a study of women's health in prisons and provide a report to the Governor and Legislature.

Every person deserves access to comprehensive healthcare services tailored to their unique needs. **NYSCADV urges the NYS Legislature to pass this legislation which would help ensure incarcerated women have access to the healthcare services they require.**
